	Question	Answer
1.	Who is eligible to apply for the grant?	Please refer to section f. Who can apply? in the RFP Guideline. The listed organisations are provided as examples only and should not be considered an exhaustive list. Any organisations are eligible as long as they can demonstrate the experience and capacity requirements outlined in section f. Alternatively, organisations may partner with multicultural services or organisations to meet the criteria.
2.	Can applications target only one geographic area within the catchment?	Yes. Proposals may focus on a specific geographic area within the catchment, as long as there is a clear rationale and supporting evidence for service delivery in that area.
3.	Does experience working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities count as experience with multicultural communities? If we haven't worked with CALD communities, will that have an impact on our eligibility?	For clarity, this project is not targeted to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations. As outlined in Section f of the RFP Guidelines, eligible organisations must demonstrate established relationships with local health services and multicultural community groups. Therefore, direct connections with the target multicultural communities are required to be eligible.
4.	If we know there are higher concentrations of CALD communities in certain areas, can we focus our proposal on those areas only?	Yes. Proposals may target specific areas with higher CALD populations, provided the application includes a clear explanation and supporting evidence.
5.	PROMs are difficult to use in women's health as there are no specific tools to measure women's	That's correct. While specific PROMs may not be relevant, other outcome measures such as improved access to healthcare, improved health literacy (among others) can be

	health consults. How do we measure program outcomes?	used to evaluate the service. Outcomes measured will depend on the agreed service model. Generic PROMs may be considered if appropriate, but they are not mandatory.
